WHO NEEDS ART CRITICS? A LOOK BEHIND THE CURTAIN

A roundtable discussion on the role of art criticism and the art critic

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (March 25, 2016) - Join a distinguished panel of art critics as they explore, in a lively conversation, the way critics establish a dialogue between a work of art and its relationship to society, making it easier for us to better understand both the work and the artist who produces it. This free event takes place on April 7 at 4 p.m. at the museum's Annenberg Theater.

Donald Osborne will lead a discussion with dynamic and talented young art critics Shana Nys Dambrot, David Pagel and art writer Steven Biller on a topic often discussed but rarely understood. The panel will explore how a critic approaches the analysis of a work, the role of historical perspectives, pedagogy, education, and crucially, the intersection of entertainment and commerce.

With the forum offering opportunities for audience questions, it's sure to be lively and informative for all, a chance to gain deep insight into this area of the art world, and to provide a valuable and entertaining learning experience. Shana Nys Dambrot is an art critic, curator, and author based in Los Angeles. She is currently LA Editor for *Whitehot Magazine*, Arts Editor for *Vs. Magazine*, Contributing Editor to *Art Ltd.*, and a contributor to the *LA Weekly, Flaunt, Huffington Post, Palm Springs Life*, and KCET's Artbound. She studied Art History at Vassar College, writes loads of essays for art books and exhibition catalogs, curates one or two exhibitions each year, and speaks in public with alarming frequency.

David Pagel, an art critic who writes regularly for the Los Angeles Times. Since 1988, he has published reviews, features and essays in Artforum, Art in America, Flash Art, frieze, and Art Issues, where he was reviews editor from 1998-2001. He is also an adjunct curator at the Parrish Art Museum, in Water Mill, NY, where he has organized EST-3: Los Angeles Art from the Beth Rudin DeWoody Collection, Underground Pop, and Damaged Romanticism: A Mirror of Modern Emotion. Other exhibitions, which typically emphasize pleasure's place in intellectual inquiry, include Painting from Another Planet (Deitch Projects), The Dreams Stuff is Made Of (Art Frankfurt), Radar Love (Galleria Marabini, Bologna), Tripod: Kyla Hansen and Dion Johnson (Claremont Graduate University), and The 10th Circle (Western Project). Recent publications include "Inside-Outsider" in Ralph Humphrey, Paintings 1972-83; "Full Circle" in Albert Contreras; "Nagle: in His Own Context," in Nagle, Ron; "Fast Times, Slow Looks" in Wendell Gladstone: D.O.A., S.O.S., ETC., and "The Handmade Imagination of John Frame," in Three Fragments of a Lost Tale.

Steven Biller has for 25 years worked as a top-level editor for regional and national magazines. For almost 12 of those years he was editorial director at Desert Publications Inc. and editor-in-chief of *Palm Springs Life* and *Pebble Beach: The Magazine*. He writes about contemporary and early California art in his new role as editor-at-large for these magazines, as well being the editor of the annual *Palm Springs Life ARTS+CULTURE*, and a contributor to *Art Itd.*, *Orange County Register Magazine*, *Montage Magazine*, and other publications. He recently launched a custom publishing firm, BILLER | CONTENT, and is a former chairman of the board of the Contemporary Art Council at Palm Springs Art Museum.

Following the program (for those who have purchased reception tickets) a reception with the panel will be held at the stunning 1958 William F. Codydesigned home of Barbara and Michael Malamut in Rancho Mirage. This home won the Palm Springs Modern Committee's 'Residential Restoration Award' award in 2014 and is a showpiece of detailed, curated restoration of an historic piece of architecture.
